Ezekiel Part 3, Week 4, Ezekiel 31-32 Judgment on Egypt (Part 2)

Day 1 – Ezekiel 31-32

Last week, we studied the first four oracles or judgments God brought upon the great nation of Egypt. Two weeks ago, we looked at God's judgment on the great port trading cities of Tyre and Sidon. Tyre and Sidon were huge in pride – they had so much stuff! Three weeks ago, we investigated God's judgment on the nations of Ammon, Moab, Edom, and Arabia. All of these judgments from God were placed on these peoples because of their pride, their inappropriate treatment of Israel and also because they refused to acknowledge God as the only true living God and Sovereign LORD over men. All of these judgments brought about the same result: All men, women and children of all the nations would know that God was the LORD. God used the Babylonians as His instrument of judgment on all these nations. Again, this week, we will look at God's judgment on the nation of Egypt only this time God says she's not all that great a nation.

Please start your study this week with at least 10 minutes of concentrated prayer for God to open your mind concerning this second set of His judgments on Egypt. I want you to begin y our study with a reread of Isaiah 18-20. See what kind of background information you can glean from these passages. Remember that the Israelites were not to worship other nations' gods and they were also not to rely on any of the other nations for protection. They were to rely on God alone. Remember also that in this time frame of Ezekiel 29-32, the land of Israel had made an alliance with Egypt to come rescue them when they were attacked by Babylon. Egypt did just that and they, too, were taken captive and overrun by the Babylonian armies.

Now, just read Ezekiel 31 and 32

Now, after you have read Ezekiel 31 and 32, go back and read it word for word. Slow your reading down enough so that you are picking up the details as you go. Be on the alert for key words that we have already identified in the other weeks of study. However, do not mark them at this time.

Now, reread these two chapters with discernment. Tomorrow, we will begin marking chapter 31.

God asks Pharaoh and his people, whom they are like in their greatness? He compares them to Assyria in its greatness in Ezekiel 31:3-17. He describes Assyria as this wonderful tree that He Himself has made beautiful. Even the trees of Eden were jealous over Assyria. However, even as great a tree as Assyria was, God still judged her for her pride and she fell. Then God asks Pharaoh again in Ezekiel 31:18 as though He is mocking Pharaoh's perception of his own greatness: "To which among the trees of Eden are you thus equal in glory and greatness?" I would like you to list what God has to say about Assyria's greatness in Ezekiel 31:3-9.

How were the "leaders in Israel" addressed according to Ezekiel 17?

What would give Pharaoh (Hopni) the idea that he was secure and mighty?

Name the three trees from the Garden of Eden that could not compare to the tree God created in the Assyrian nation.

How does God describe these three trees' emotions in human terms?

In the next space provided below, I would like you to list what God did to Assyria and why He did it from Ezekiel 31:10-17.

Why will Assyria fall? See Ezekiel 31:10-14. How was Assyria's pride explained?

How does God describe the king/nation who will destroy Assyria? See Ezekiel 31:11.

Is God really referring to Assyria here or is He referring to Babylon? Or is Nebuchadnezzar the "despot of the nations," who will totally destroy the Assyrian empire who ruled before the Babylonians?

Why would God compare Egypt to Assyria and not to another nation?

Assyria was of great consequence to Egypt for two reasons:

- 1. Up until this time, Assyria had been the only nation from the Cradle of Civilization area to ever invade Egypt. Assyria did so in 633 B.C. and she destroyed the Egyptian capital of Thebes.
- 2. Assyria had been the world empire that had been quickly overturned by the Babylonians.

What will the alien tyrants of the nations do to Assyria according to Ezekiel according to 31:12?

According to Ezekiel 31:12, what will happen to "all the peoples of the earth," who have been under Assyria's care when Assyria is left dead on the mountains, in all the valleys, and in all the ravines of the land where they have fallen and have been cut down?

Where will all the birds of the heavens dwell according to Ezekiel 31:13? Where will all the beasts of the field be?

Why will all the birds of the heavens dwell in Assyria's broken branches? See Ezekiel 31:14.

Who has "felled" this great tree of Assyria?

Who are "all the trees by the waters," which will not be exalted in their stature, nor set atop the clouds, nor stand erect in their height? See Ezekiel 31:14. Why will God not allow these other nations to be exalted like Assyria? Does this mean that Egypt's ambition to be a world power was doomed to failure, too?

What will happen to these "trees by the waters," instead of glory? What is the fate of all men? Are all men equal in death? Did both the Assyrians' and the Egyptians' destinies lie in the pit of hell? Why?

How did the nations react to the fall of Assyria? See 31:15-18.

What did God cause to happen according to Ezekiel 31:15-17?

What part did the "nations" play in Assyria's reign on the known earth at the time? See Ezekiel 31:16-17? What happened to the nations as a result of their sinfulness? Did God comfort the trees of Eden? Who are these trees of Eden?

Was Egypt equal in glory and greatness to any of the trees of Eden? Why or why not?

What does it mean that Egypt will lie "in the midst of the uncircumcised?" What does the death of the "uncircumcised" imply?

Why was God so very hard on Egypt? Really think on this one. Don't skip over this! Think on the history of the two nations of Egypt and Israel.

Why would God have allowed me to see this? To what does He want me to pay special attention?

Chapters 31 and 32 of Ezekiel are also lamentations just like Ezekiel 30 that we studied last week. As a reminder, what is "a lamentation?"

Also, again, from chapter 31, why is God so very hard on Egypt?

How does God describe Pharaoh and how does Pharaoh describe himself in Ezekiel 32:2?

How will God spread His net over this monster in the sea? See Ezekiel 32:3?

What will happen to this monster in the sea when he is left on the land, in an open field according to Ezekiel 32:4-6? Does the blood thing here remind you of one of the ten plagues leveled on Egypt when Israel was still in their land as captives?

What will happen to the heavenly bodies when God extinguishes Egypt? See Ezekiel 32:7-8. Does this remind you of one of the ten plagues leveled on Egypt when Israel was still in their land as captives?

God's judgment on Egypt will extend to the "many peoples," whom Egypt has not even known. What will happen to the hearts of these "many peoples," when God's judgment on Egypt becomes evident? See Ezekiel 32:9-10.

God uses the Babylonians to "catch" Egypt in God's net and let her die as in Ezekiel 32:3. God will also use the Babylonian's sword to carry out His judgment on Egypt.

What will happen to "all its multitude" or "all of Egypt" when God devastates her pride by the hand of the Babylonians? Will the animals of Egypt suffer, too? Will the land of Egypt suffer, also? See Ezekiel 32:11-15.

What will be the desired ultimate response that Egypt will have to God's judgment upon them according to Ezekiel 32: 15?

Where did Egypt and her multitudes go after being slain by the sword? See Ezekiel 32:17-21.

Where did Assyria and all her company go after being slain by the sword? See Ezekiel 32:22-23.

Where did Elam and her multitude go after being slain by the sword? See Ezekiel 32:24-25.

Where did Meshech, Tubal and all their multitudes go after being slain by the sword? See Ezekiel 32:16-28.

Where did Edom, its kings, and its princes, go after being slain by the sword? See Ezekiel 32:29.

Where did the chiefs of the north and all the Sidonians go after being slain by the sword? See Ezekiel 32:30.

What correlation is there between "the uncircumcised," and those who go down to the "pit," "Sheol," "the nether world," or "the lower parts of the earth?" See Ezekiel 32:19,21, 24-30, 32.

What must have been going on in the minds of Pharaoh and his people when God said all of these nations were waiting for them in Sheol? Pharaoh may have been mighty on this earth, but the same fate awaited him as all those who had gone before him in death.

In the end, Egypt suffered the same judgment for her pride as all the other nations, greater or smaller than herself. All men, who were not of the circumcised, will be responsible for their own actions in this life; they will die the same death; they will make their eternal bed in the "pit." All men, who are not of the circumcised, are those who openly defy the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, who shake their finger in the face of the Sovereign LORD of the Universe and deny Him access to their hearts and their will. Notice that all these statements have "they will" as their premise. All of these men refuse to see God's right to His claim on their lives. They know better than God how to live their own lives. They know better than God what is right for them. They know better than God their

position in this life. They know better than God what is right and what is wrong. Do they now? In all of this, "They shall know that I AM the LORD!"

Day 5 - Personal reflection:

These questions are as much for me as they are for you.

What will happen to the nations, like Iran, who openly defy the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob?

What do we know will happen to those nations who do not bless Israel, but indeed curse her and want to wipe her off the face of the planet?

What happened to Germany after WWII? Were they completely annihilated as a nation or were they, by the grace of God, allowed to come back and live as a nation?

I wonder what the Islamic faith will think about their religion having "nation" status when it is time for God's judgments to be passed out once again to the nations. This month marks the thirtieth anniversary of the first Islamic state of Iran – a nation where their religion is the law of the land – Sharia law. Their religion as law requires them to seek the return of the Islamic Mahdi, the 12th Imam. Their religion as law requires them to actively provoke the chaotic state the world must be in for the return of their messiah. Their religion as law requires them to do everything possible to bring about the destruction of Israel and the United States.

What will happen to this nation? Or more accurately, what is happening to this nation right now? Last week, I heard for the first time, that, we, the people, have turned our backs on God, and that the United States has now come under God's judgment. I heard it from David Wilkerson, from Franklin Graham, and from Larry Snapp on Sunday morning in his prayer. Always, in the Scripture, when God repeats the same thing three times, He wants us to pay attention to what He is saying. I know this is not Scripture, but I do think the Holy Spirit has inspired this warning. He wants us to pay attention not only to our Christian leaders, but also to the current times and events that are occurring around us

What is our biggest idol or sin in this country? Who have we been bowing down to worship? Is it not ourselves and our own comfort? Is it not our own self-indulgence or our independence from God rule? We want big government to rule our lives, but we don't

want our Creator, our loving, Sovereign Lord, to have a say in what we are doing or how we are living our lives?
Have we denied God access to our children in our schools?
Have we denied Him access to our lives if just for Sunday morning alone?
Have we refused to properly respond to the Sabbath in which He has given us to rest and reflect on Him? Do you ever wonder if we would be in such horrible financial shape in this country if we had kept Saturday or Sunday as no-work days?
Do you know better than God how to live your own life?
Do you know better than God what is right for you?
Do you know better than God your position in this life?
Do you know better than God what is right and what is wrong? Do you have your own sense of right and wrong or has it been based on what God says about it in His word?
The people of Ezekiel's time were terrified when Egypt fell. Egypt was as important to the other nations in Ezekiel's day as we (the USA) are important to all those nations surrounding us in our day. What effect would the overnight destruction of the United States have on the rest of the world?
What will happen to us, the USA, if we reject the light that God has given us? This light from God we have been given is similar in amount and content to the light the Egyptians had been given.

These two chapters (31 and 32) on Egypt conclude this section about the judgment on all the other nations surrounding Israel. Next week we will start a new section that will reveal all the blessings that will be given the nation of Israel. As with Isaiah, I believe this next section is going to be a whole lot more uplifting than the judgment section on Israel and the other nations that we've studied so far in Ezekiel. I am so glad that we are at this point in our study. I'm tired of all the doom and gloom. However, I must admit, that I am much more aware in my understanding of our present world than I was 18 weeks ago. How about you? How far have you come in your understanding of the times that we live in? What have you learned concerning protecting, providing, and warning for your own children for the dark days that are surely coming? There is no doubt, in my mind anyway, the end times are upon us and the judgment process has begun in our nation. The other nations – those against Israel, will soon be judged, also. I don't think I'm supposed to be happy about the other nations' judgment, but I am (at least a little bit). One thing I can be ecstatic about for sure is that when this judgment is all said and done, all from all the nations of the world will know that God is the LORD!

- <u>31:2</u> "Son of man, say to Pharaoh king of Egypt, and to his multitude, 'Whom are you like in your greatness?
- 31:3 'Behold, Assyria was a cedar in Lebanon With beautiful branches and forest shade, And very high; And its top was among the clouds.
- 31:4 'The waters made it grow, the deep made it high. With its rivers it continually extended all around its planting place, And it sent out its channels to all the trees of the field.

- 32:2 "Son of man, take up a lamentation over Pharaoh king of Egypt, and say to him, 'You compared yourself to a young lion of the nations, Yet you are like the monster in the seas; And you burst forth in your rivers, And muddied the waters with your feet, And fouled their rivers."
- 32:3 Thus says the Lord GOD, "Now I will spread My net over you With a company of many peoples, And they shall lift you up in My net.
- 32:4 "And I will leave you on the land; I will cast you on the open field. And I will cause all the birds of the heavens to dwell on you, And I will satisfy the beasts of the whole earth with you.
- 32:5 "And I will lay your flesh on the mountains, And fill the valleys with your refuse.
- 32:6 "I will also make the land drink the discharge of your blood, As far as the mountains, And the ravines shall be full of you.
- 32:7 "And when I extinguish you, I will cover the heavens, and darken their stars; I will cover the sun with a cloud, And the moon shall not give its light.
